Cell Phones

Please help us help your student(s) honor our technology usage expectations. If they need to communicate home, we will let them do so from the office.

Cell Phones & Electronic Devices (from the Pella MS student/parent handbook)

Cell phones should remain OFF except for before school, at lunch, or after the final bell unless cleared through the office or their teacher. Teachers may ask to hold a student's cell phone while a student uses the restroom. Students are encouraged not to bring personal electronic devices to school. <u>The school is not responsible for lost or stolen items</u>. Detentions will be issued for repeated offenses, or if these items create a classroom disruption (i.e. cell phones ringing or vibrating in class). The school is not liable for lost, stolen, or damaged electronic devices.

Permissible technology use at lunch:

- playing games
- listening to music
- surfing the web

- Nonpermissible technology use at lunch: (not limited to the following)
- text messaging, facebooking, social networking, emailing, snapchatting, tweeting, etc.
- phone calls
- taking photos of classmates, teachers, or staff without permission
- utilizing personal devices or phones in restrooms, locker rooms, changing rooms, etc.

Steps for dealing with technological devices misuse:

- 1* incident: Staff will confiscate, give to the office, and it will be given back after final bell by the office.
- $2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ incident: Student will pick-up the item from the principal, dean, or counselor.

 3^{**} incident: Parents will pick up phone after the third incident from the principal. If the student brings the phone back to school after the third incident, the phone will spend minimally three school days in the principal's office. The student may be asked to leave the phone at home or in the principal's office daily if the problem persists or is serious enough in nature (i.e. cyberbullying or taking or sharing photos without permission).

**Detention may be issued if deemed necessary.

8th Grade Students Read to Elementary Students

The 8th grade students of Pella Middle School were assigned a project to write children's books. When their books were finished, they would read them to Kindergarten-3rd grade students. First, the 8th graders were put into groups of 3-4. Then they were to make a story plot with their group so they could have a plan for their children's stories. When the 8th grader's story plots were approved by their teachers, they could start on their rough drafts of their books.



They didn't have to worry about making the rough drafts neat - just have a good outlook of their final drafts.



After the group's rough drafts were tweaked and approved by their teacher, they were given the okay to start writing their final drafts on a blank hardcover book. The final book had to include these things in order: an appealing cover, a copyright page, a title page, their final story (filling every page in between), an author page, and finally a back cover with just a copyright barcode. The 8th grade groups were also graded on how well they were efficient workers and how they stayed on task with their group members.

Finally, the 8th grade class was split apart and taken by bus to go to either Madison Elementary or Lincoln Elementary. There, the groups went from class to class reading to the Kindergarten-3rd grade students. Most elementary classes had lines that the 8th grade readers had to wait to read to those classes. Overall this experience was fun and went well for the middle school students.

8th Grade Students Prepare for High School

High School Orientation – February 11, 2016

Eighth grade students will travel to Pella High School on Thursday, February 11, from 12:00 - 3:00 to learn more about where they are heading next year. The high school administrators, counselors, and students will prepare an afternoon full of information and experiences for our students, so they have a deeper understanding about what is to come in the very near future. The athletic director will also share with them about extra curricular opportunities, and he will continue to encourage all students to get involved. There are more clubs, fine arts, and athletic experiences at Pella High School than there are here, and we want all students to be a part of a successful team. Please be watching for this day, and ask your son/daughter about their experience. A week or two later, Mrs. Pentico will work with the high school counselors to assist the students in registering for their classes for next year. This is an exciting time; however, it can also be an anxious time. Talk with your students, and encourage them to talk with us about how we can assist them with this transition.

Iowa Assessments ~ February 8, 9, & 11

Students will take their final Iowa Assessments of their educational careers because a new state level test will be administered next year. The Iowa Assessments are a series of tests given annually to measure students' achievement in areas such as reading, math, science, vocabulary, and social studies.

These assessments are important as they allow each student, parent, teacher and administrator to assess individual, as well as grade-level and building-level, academic progress. The test results also enable us to evaluate how our students fare compared to students from across the state and nation. In addition, scores from these tests are considered when students are selected for special programs such as gifted and talented, higher/lower level core classes, intervention courses, and special education.

Federal law requires states administer annual exams to measure student achievement. This legislation requires schools demonstrate significant growth, and sanctions are administered by the federal government if schools fail to meet yearly progress goals. While the goals and timeline established by the federal government are lofty, by working together, we can meet and exceed their expectations.

This is an exciting yet busy time for 8th grade students as they prepare to make the transition to high school. There are a number of dates I would like to call to your attention, and I would also like to encourage you to attend the informational parent meeting on Monday, February 15.

**December - February - 4-Year Plans

Every 8th grade student in the state of lowa is required to put together a 4-year plan using the I Have a Plan lowa (IHAPI) website. Students have been completing inventories that assess their personalities, interests, abilities, strengths, and values. Based upon their answers, they have been directed to a variety of career clusters where they can explore programs of study (a.k.a. majors) and careers. In the upcoming weeks, students will utilize this information to develop high school 4-year plans. These plans are intended to get them thinking about options beyond high school and how they can best prepare themselves for those options. I encourage you to have conversations with your children about these topics throughout this process.

**Thursday, February 11 - 8th Grade Orientation

Eighth grade students will spend the afternoon at the high school touring the building and learning more about elective class offerings.

**Monday, February 15 - 8th Grade Parent Informational Meeting

A meeting will be held at 7:00pm in the Pella High School Auditorium for parents/guardians of 8th grade students to discuss topics which may include high school registration, course information and options, and graduation requirements, among many other things. Please make plans to attend this informative meeting. Students do not need to attend.

**Monday, February 15 - Excellence in Electives

Excellence in Electives will be held from 5:30pm - 7:30pm at Pella High School. This is a great opportunity for students to gain more information about electives that are offered at the high school from both teachers as well as current high school students. A variety of extracurricular activities will also be on display. Excellence in Electives is conducted in an "openhouse" style so students and parents may come and go as they choose.

**Tuesday, March 1 - Registration

Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. Manning, Pella High School Counselors, will be at the middle school to demonstrate to 8th grade students the process of registering for high school classes, and students will begin registration. The 4-year planning process is also designed to aid in this process so many of these discussions and decisions will have taken place even before registration begins.
